I also took with me many colouring books of Bible stories, pencils, games, puzzles, and a lot of sweets for the children...




...and a King James Bible for Arjun.

I understand what he meant. During this mission we experienced so many magnificent things it would be difficult for some people to believe them all.

This wonderful mission truly was an adventure travelling to some of the very remote areas in the foothills of the Himalayas.



The small Yeti Airways plane was a 45 minute flight but would have been 18 hours by bus.



We used several 4x4s to drive over rugged 'roads'.

We crossed over rickety old suspension bridges and even had the help of a Sherpa to go where the 4x4s couldn't.



Reaching the Lost



This ministry's mandate is to go into all the world and preach the Gospel. When we do, we always see people respond to the Gospel (58 in total during this mission) and we always see miracles.

After three hours of travelling along the worst roads I had ever been on we arrived at the tiny village of Hedongba which is near the Chinese border.





Around 120 people huddled together sitting on boulders at the top of the world under a thousand stars in temperatures of -10°C to hear the good news of Jesus.

The majority of people listening were Hindus (Nepal is a Hindu country and it is illegal to preach the Gospel here).



What we were doing was totally illegal but the Gospel has to be preached. If we had been arrested we would have been sentenced to up to 30 days in prison.



Because the village was so remote there were no police nearby. After preaching, 24 Hindus prayed to receive Jesus Christ as their Lord and Saviour. We saw many miracles of healing too including the lame walking, paralysed arms moving and freedom from joint pain.



The Reality of Missions



Due to the remoteness of this village there were no hotels nearby so we slept on the church floor. My bed for the night was a straw mat covered with blankets on the dirt floor. The church was made from corrugated iron. It was freezing.

This wasn't the only time we had to rough it. In the town of Noom we stayed at a pastor's house for the night. Again, it was made out of corrugated iron.



In both these locations there was no electricity, no running water, no toilet and of course no internet.



This was just a couple of nights but it gave me a small glimpse of the way persecuted Christians live in so many parts of the world.

The morning views weren't bad though.

Teaching the Found

It was a privilege to serve pastors and church leaders in Kathmandu, Khadbari, Dingla, Noom, and Hedongba.



We taught on the Power of the Holy Spirit, Principles of Prayer, Faith, and the Blood of Jesus.



In many of these meetings people were healed and set free. The most frequent healings we saw were the lame walking, paralysed arms being restored (photo left) and breathing difficulties healed. It was awesome to see the response when people were able to do things they could not do previously. God is good.
